Performance measures for this solicitation are as follows:

Objective	Performance Measures	Data Grantee Provides
<p>The program objectives will depend upon the specific project funded. Generally, most projects can be classified into one or more of the following categories:</p> <p>Direct Service Prevention Program. Examples of objectives may include prevention of delinquency risk behaviors, improvement in family functioning, or prevention of child victimization (including abuse and neglect).</p> <p>Direct Service Intervention Program. Examples of objectives may include intervening with delinquent youth or status offenders and/or system-involved families.</p> <p>Systems Improvement Project</p>	<p>PART-related measures* are mandatory if applicable to the specific program goals and objectives. Examples follow.</p> <p>Direct Service Program (Prevention/Intervention)</p> <p>*Percent of program youth who offend or reoffend (arrested/rearrested).</p> <p>*Percent of program youth and/or families exhibiting desired change in targeted behaviors (depends on specific behavior targeted and might include substance use, antisocial behavior, school attendance, gang involvement, etc.).</p> <p>Number of program youth and/or families served.</p> <p>Number of service hours completed by program youth and/or families.</p> <p>Systems Improvement project</p>	<p>OJJDP is developing an online reporting system so that grantees will be able to submit data to OJJDP electronically.</p> <p>Direct Service Program (Prevention/Intervention)</p> <p>Number of program youth who offend or reoffend, compared to number of program youth served.</p> <p>Number of program youth and/or families exhibiting desired change in targeted behaviors, compared to number of program youth served.</p> <p>Number of program youth and/or families served.</p> <p>Number of service hours completed by program youth and/or families.</p> <p>Systems Improvement project</p>

Examples of objectives may include to enhance organizational capacity, improve program quality, and improve system effectiveness through provision of training and/or technical assistance.</p>	<p>*Number of youth and/or families with whom an evidence-based practice was used.</p> <p>Number of program materials developed.</p> <p>Number of planning activities conducted.</p> <p>Percent of program staff trained.</p>	<p>Number of youth and/or families with whom an evidence-based practice was used.</p> <p>Number of program materials developed.</p> <p>Number of planning activities conducted.</p> <p>Number of program staff trained, compared to total number of program staff.</p>
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
